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Get to Know Your Professor

London has been one of my favorite places on the planet since I first visited over forty years ago. I have been sharing my love for London with students in the CCSA program since the 1990s, and I believe that study abroad is an essential and life-changing experience for any student. A California native, I earned my PhD at UCLA and have been teaching at NKU since 1991. One of the things I love about being an English professor is being able to teach and write about all my cultural interests, from American literature to pop music to romantic comedies to, of course, the Harry Potter series. This will be my sixth time teaching Harry Potter on the Page and on the Screen, and it's a magical experience every time!

Course Description

You've read the books and seen the movies. Now explore the process of turning novels into films and the place of the Harry Potter phenomenon in contemporary British culture. In our course, we will discuss the complexities involved in narrative adaptation to the medium of movies, while experiencing the places that inspired the books and provided unforgettable locations for the films. Field trips to such places as Oxford University, Kew Gardens, and the Globe Theatre are designed to deepen your understanding of the cultural and historical context of the Potter novels. And a tour of the Harry Potter exhibit at Warner Bros. London studios will be a highlight, illustrating the technical aspects of movie production. Muggles and wizards welcome!

Course Level and Credit Hours

Lower or upper division undergraduate level. May count towards general education requirements at your school. Three credit hours.

Prerequisite(s)

For Upper Division credit, students must have completed the minimum written composition requirements at their home institution or receive consent of instructor.

Upon completion of all coursework with a passing grade and full participation in course activities, students shall be able to:

- Demonstrate their enhanced critical understanding of the significance of popular narratives developed by experiencing the specific social and artistic culture of London and Great Britain
- Display an enhanced understanding of the importance and influence of place in the creation of literary and movie narratives
- Effectively use key terms and concepts in the analysis of movies and literature
- Write critically about movie adaptation using these terms and concepts

Required Readings and Materials

All seven Harry Potter novels.

All eight Harry Potter movies.

Onsite Learning Experiences and Activities

Onsite learning experiences in this class will likely include the following site visits. This is a tentative list, which will be replaced with a detailed daily itinerary of class meetings and field trips prior to the departure date.

- A walking tour of book and movie locations around London
- A trip to Oxford to tour Harry Potter locations in Oxford
- The Harry Potter set tour at Warner Bros. studios
- Attending *Harry Potter and the Cursed Child*, Parts One and Two
- Trip to the London Zoo
- Trip to Kew Gardens
- Trip to Globe Theatre

Attendance Policy

Attendance is mandatory at all scheduled activities and class meetings, as well as field trip excursions. This includes any virtual meetings before and after the onsite experience. Repeated absences, including for ill health, will require documentation to be excused.

Failure to attend class meetings or field trips can result in a grade deduction per absence. In addition to our scheduled field trips and CCSA whole group trips, I hope to include some additional cultural events.

Academic Integrity Policy

All references to other sources should be acknowledged. Instances of academic dishonesty may result in a significant lowering of your final grade or failure of the course.

Physical Expectations

The program requires walking 3-5 miles per day on uneven pavement in all kinds of weather and long periods of standing. Students must be able to carry their own bags and belongings.
